The National Black Women's HIV/AIDS Network commends President Barrack Obama for honoring his commitment to addressing the domestic HIV/AIDS epidemic. We are pleased that the President and his administration have been ever diligent in developing a National HIV/AIDS Strategy that presents a roadmap for the country's response to the epidemic with three primary goals:

- Reducing the number of new infections;
- Increasing access to care and optimizing health outcomes for people living with HIV; and
- Reducing HIV-related health disparities.

Though we remain hopeful, as Black women living with, at risk of, and affected by HIV/AIDS, we cannot help but wonder if this will be the plan that we **all** have been waiting for. If African American women are to embrace this strategy as a serious transparent plan, it must address the issues of gender and racial inequity relative to Black women and HIV/AIDS in this country. While indeed an ambitious plan, the National HIV/AIDS Strategy must fully recognize the impact of HIV/AIDS on African American Women as well as outline an approach that will follow the trends of the epidemic.

These are issues NBWHAN will focus on during our review of the strategy in addition to whether the plan indicates a clear strategy with and for African American women.
